Artificial Intelligence

For our March Monthly Meeting I arranged for a retired software engineer to explain to our members "What is AI?". Our speaker Peter Lord was a u3a member and is part of the national AI team of the Third Age Trust.

I knew the subject was complicated but underestimated the science, logical processes and reasoning power behind the subject which was actually pioneered by Alan Turing and colleagues throughout the 1950s.

There were Classical AI and Machine Learning AI which were developed in the last century: they promised much and delivered far less. Attempts to mimic the human brain and attempts to identify principles of how the human brain works, also had very limited success.

In the new century artificial neural networks were developed where compatible AI software is shown lots of data and images and neurons in layers, essentially combinations of decision networks, enable it to recognise and identify desired combinations of information. Having been shown many images of dogs and cats which have been labelled as such, the AI can say with great accuracy whether any new images is a dog or a cat. The AI system works even though we cannot make sense of how it does it. The level of computing power to run this AI is very demanding in complexity and energy use, but it works! The latest developments essentially look at everything that has ever been written in every language and can answer every question that they can ever be posed, but on a statistical basis. However, this means the AI will answer the same

question in different ways. Also it will not have been trained on yesterday's newspapers. So do check what the AI says!

These developments in AI makes us highly nervous as to how it will change our lives. The biggest fear is that it may take people's jobs leading to a technical and society-wide revolution. But jobs change and hopefully it will provide jobs that were not there before, similar to the development of the computer in the workplace.

AI is a powerful tool and Google DeepMind is developing neural networks not needing human interference, as it learns from its own experience. What if scientists create an AI that rivals or exceeds the full range of what human intelligence can do? How do we control it? Jack Good, a colleague of Alan Turing, wrote: "The first Ultra Intelligent machine is the last invention that man need ever make provided that the machine is docile enough to tell us how to keep it under control". A super intelligent AI is alarming but in reality that is not coming soon, hopefully giving man time to learn how to control it. AI is still fundamentally limited, it can find patterns in complicated data often better than we can but it cannot yet convert these into meaningful, conceptual thinking so crucial to our intelligence. I recommend you to watch the TV documentary programs on AI to hopefully keep you up to date with this fast developing reality.

What a piece of work – April 2026

Kings & Queens of England from 1066 -

A magnificent piece of embroidery, sewn by a member of the Sew n Sew Group.

This embroidery shows a whimsical **cross-stitch**

embroidery titled "**Kings & Queens of England since 1066**," depicting the English and British monarchs from William the Conqueror to King Charles III. They are arranged chronologically in rows, with their names stitched underneath. Many are depicted with humorous or historically inspired poses and accessories:

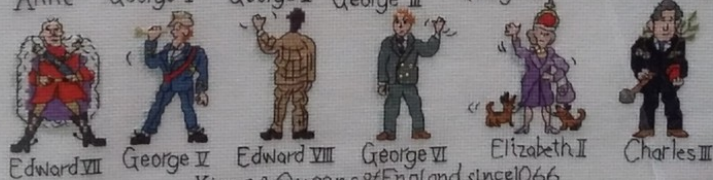
- **Top Rows:** Early monarchs like **William I**, **Richard I** (in armour), and **John** (holding a document, probably the Magna Carta).
- **Middle Rows:** Highlights include **Henry VIII** (shown as

quite stout), the short-reigned **Lady Jane Grey**, and **Elizabeth I** in her iconic ruff collar.

- **Lower Rows:** Features the **Hanoverian Georges**, **Queen Victoria** in mourning black, and 20th-century monarchs like **George VI** and **Elizabeth II**.
- **Final Figure:** The bottom right shows King **Charles III**.

The playful illustrations help to make history more memorable for us all.

Sew n Sew supports 'Surrey stands with Ukraine'

Since September 2025, the Sew n Sew Group have been supporting the 'Surrey stands with Ukraine' organization.

The group have been supporting Ukrainians with aid in the form of clothing, food and other supplies.

It started with knitting a few hats to help the Ukrainians survive their long



hard cold winters. It then moved onto to collecting winter clothing and food and now we are collecting food - tinned or dried which is regularly delivered to Ukraine. Appeals were made at our U3a members meeting and clothing and food came in abundance. With the help of the friends and family of the Sew n Sew Group these donations were taken to the Epsom collection point.

In the January members meeting, we had a short and interesting presentation from one of the founder members of this charitable set up. On the first day of his retirement he was asked to get involved and some 4 years later he is still actively supporting the Ukrainians. So far not only has food and clothing been collected but also arrangements for mobility aids to be donated to the many injured. Enough money has been collected to buy a second hand fire engine which has now arrived in Ukraine. It is surprising, with a few pertinent questions to the right people, how so much more has been collected.
